SHELDON HALL

GHC club has been invited to perform as hometown musicians in the 'Notes from Home" series on March 27, a Tuesday evening. On that date the club will play at the Sheldon Hall instead of at the usual Rock Church facility. The program will include two 45-minute sessions with a 15-minute intermission. The tickets cost \$10 each and our club will earn half the ticket sales. We have prepared a variety of types of songs: Golden Oldies, Big Band, nationality tributes, some solo numbers, and some of our usual performance pleasers. Please join in supporting this endeavor. Weencourage you to invite friends and family to attend. It is quite an honor to perform at the Sheldon!

The Sheldon Concert Hall in St. Louis, Missouri was designed by noted 1904 World's Fair architect **Louis C. Spiering** and built in 1912 as the home of the Ethical Society of St. Louis. Musicians and public speakers throughout the years have enjoyed the perfect acoustics of the Sheldon Concert Hall, earning The Sheldon its reputation as "The Carnegie Hall of St. Louis.

Well-known singers and ensembles have performed at The Sheldon, and speakers such as Albert Einstein, Dwight Eisenhower and Ernest Hemingway have spoken from its stage. The St. Louis Chapter of the League of Women Voters was founded in The Sheldon's Green Room.

When the Ethical Society relocated to St. Louis County in 1964, The Sheldon became primarily a music venue. Then, in 1974, a former singer with the Duke Ellington Orchestra purchased the facility, transforming The Sheldon into a church and the site for many jazz and gospel concerts. A California attorney with a love for chamber music purchased the building in 1984 at the urging of the Paganini String Quartet. He engaged Walter F. Gunn to restore the building and upon completion Gunn began operating The Sheldon in 1986 as a venue for concerts and community events.

Determined to preserve and establish The Sheldon as one of St. Louis' greatest cultural resources, Gunn founded the non-profit Sheldon Arts Foundation in 1988. The Foundation purchased the building in 1991, and today the Sheldon Arts Foundation is governed by a 45-member Board of Directors. The Sheldon Concert Hall is the site of over 300 events each year, including jazz, folk and classical music concerts, featuring artists such as Dave Brubeck, Wynton Marsalis, José Carreras, Herbie Hancock, Doc Watson, Joan Baez, Willie Nelson, Julian Bream, Itzhak Perlman, B.B. King, and Jessye Norman.In addition,

The Sheldon presents Family Concerts, educational programs for schools and Coffee Concerts. The "Notes From Home" series, featuring St. Louis musicians, is presented weekday evenings. The Sheldon Ballroom, Spiering Room and Art Galleries host workshops and master classes, post-concert receptions, fundraising events, corporate presentations and community meetings.

The Sheldon's renovations continued in 2001 with the installation of five new stained-glass windows designed by Rodney Winfield. His designs, called "Theme and Variation", are designed to be seen both during the day and at night. The Sheldon is located in the Grand Center arts district at 3648 Washington Blvd. of St. Louis.

LETTERS: from **Mike Maschek**

This past year was fairly busy for me, playing mostly as a soloist at 2 locations, sometimes 3, each week. I think I have developed a little more in the presentation of the music getting the feel of a song and in using drama in execution of the notes, bending slightly here and there as the song progresses. Often on the second time thru the melody, I will play double stops or chords with tongue rhythm. Along with the guitars this works well, for instance, in my version of Spanish Eyes. In addition, I have a couple good friends who control the sound boards at various locations, and they provide me with a Harmonicats style echo and it makes me sound like a million dollars. I love it! Blue Bayou, Harbor Lights, Twilight Time and even polkas, to my pleasure, are enhanced. It seems that the echo can cover some of the glitches I force through those chambers. I practice about 4 or 5 times a week, sometimes more, so I can execute songs with a professional air. We use no sound tracks, it's all live.

The Bull Shoals Theater season goes from April to November, every Monday, including a Christmas Show. Unfortunately the last two jams in November were cancelled as well as the Christmas show. I would have partnered with my accordion friend, Bob Burazin. He runs the Theater and is often too busy doing that and he also works for a Wal-Mart.

During the entire 2011 year I had no opportunity to have the accordion support. In the jam groups there are numerous guitar players of various skill but only one, Ted Hobbs, is willing and capable of working with me. A very generous and kind man we usually go over a song just before the beginning of the jams. I have very few chord sheets to show him, but the few that I have come in handy when Ted can't figure out what I'm doing. One song I was fortunate to have written out in chords is, Somewhere My Love. It goes quite well a long as no one else drowns Ted out. Very often someone who thinks they know how a song goes will get over enthused and overwhelm my support. This happens when I play Darktown Strutters Ball. Most of the time I really don't know exactly what the audience hears even though we have monitors. After

the session I usually ask the sound man what the audience heard. If he says it sounded great, I'm satisfied and leave it at that.

The Mountain Home Senior Center is the second location I play, every Friday night, all year. It's a jam type thing again. When you consistently go to these places the other players often hear certain songs from previous sessions, so the jamming improves. Nearly every one of the regular players can play with me, with authority, in the *Military Medley*. Admission is free but it's just a hall where the sound gets crashing and voices mix in.

The Flippin Senior Center is yet another location. The hall is somewhat smaller and attitude is very informal. The polkas I play, accompanied by one, Diane's Stump Fiddle, bouncing and dancing, goes over real well. With her, I'll play tunes *like Tic Toc, Beer Barrel*, and half of the GHC's *Polka Medley, Too Fat* and *Tzena* also.

Finally, there's a restaurant, Reelem' In Catsfish, in Mountain Home where Ted and Tim Hobbs, his son on bass, John Neighbors on Banjo and a 15 year old genius, Alex Hilliker on fiddle, play one after another Country and Blue Grass tunes. Using Ted's invitation, I'll drop in 2 or so times a month, on Thursdays to play a couple tunes. Last time there, we played Blue Bayou, Twilight Time and Tic Toc Polka. It provides a variety for his audience and they seem to like it very much. I can do some tunes that are considered country and can help out in playing harmony, depending on the key. I use only a C harp so I guess what I'm doing is called cross harp. I find that I could harmonize on many of their songs but it's safe for me to work in the keys of G, F, D and A. These keys are used most often. I still have a lot to learn.
